WE RISE UNITED: DIGITAL WITNESS TOOLKIT

The purpose of the We Rise United: Digital Witness Toolkit is to support ongoing dialogue within the faith community about racism, bias, discrimination, privilege, and more by engaging through social media to extend the reach of equality and justice.

As the people called Methodists, our mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world in ministry and witness. We unite to end racism to transform the world through the enactment of policies aimed at fostering justice. We seek the world's transformation by the renewal of heart sets, mindsets, and skill sets that reflect the love and light of Jesus. We are also called to be and build beloved community — which includes being an antiracist church — together, by affirming our shared personhood. We are not against anyone. And we stand for faithful, just, and fair policies and practices that afford equal human rights for all.

WHY WE MUST RISE TO END RACISM?

Racism is a sin, and we must reject it wherever it exists. It endeavors to permeate our society and potential, as all other sin does. It can appear subtle and benign. Yet it seeks to destroy us: our joy, our love for one another, our souls. It challenges us to deny its presence, defend its power and pervasiveness, and minimize its impact. So, we must continue to examine ourselves and our biases, seek timely and effective ways to identify racism, uproot it, and make no room for it within our hearts, homes, communities, churches, workplaces, and world. God created humanity in the Image of God and breathed human dignity into our being. With this in mind, we lean into this work and do so not for a moment, but for a lifetime.

WHY WE RISE UNITED?

The We Rise United Project affirms our collective global United Methodist commitment to end racism. Specifically, the Baltimore-Washington Conference is living out its commitment to be a beloved community and anti-racist church that is ever-growing in its intercultural competence, addressing the intent of the Northeastern Jurisdiction Call to Action on Racial Justice, and increasing BWC's cultural humility so that more transformed lives can transform lives in a sustainable way. Justice is a spiritual discipline. It is the way that we can love God and neighbor together.

We Rise United to become an anti-racist church that is focused on dismantling racism in our communities, and committed to seeking justice now and always, so that all are affirmed as sacred, worthy, and equal.

We Rise United to educate ourselves and those around us of the history of racism and its impact on people's lives in our community and around the world.

And, we will Rise in solidarity together until all are free. We invite you to lift your voice with us to support the momentum of a movement that continues to Rise.

#WERISEUNITED DIGITAL WITNESS

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As people of God, we uphold scripture and its power in our work. As United Methodists, we focus our lives and witness on three core principles, known as the General Rules of the Church, inspired by John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. These principles were expertly reframed in "Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living," by retired United Methodist Bishop Rueben P. Job.

The principles and charges are clear and straightforward: "Do no harm. Do good. Stay in love with God."

We believe and affirm the guidance of these charges personally and online as we engage in digital witness to support the end of racism in our society.

The #WeRiseUnited Digital Witness Toolkit is a starting point to equip and empower disciples to engage in conversations that help dismantle racism in our communities and systems, wherever it exists, beginning with ourselves.





DO NO HARM

LOOK + LISTEN + RESEARCH:

An overwhelming amount of information is directed toward us daily, and it can be challenging to focus on what is most important and accurate. As you consider a post, begin with prayer and do no harm. Take a moment to examine posts, the site referenced or shared, and the person or group that made the original post. We live in a diverse world, and we must all do our part to reduce harm and dispel false narratives wherever possible. Cross-reference information from reputable sources to ensure what you are encountering is in fact true.



AVOID SHARING CONTENT WHICH IS TRAUMATIC:

Do not share violent or graphic content. No matter your intent, it is essential to consider that videos of Black or Brown people being abused and hurt can cause additional harm, great sadness, anger, or fear. The trauma of racism is real. Understand that we should speak out, but we must do so without causing additional harm. Where possible, consider offering a reflection on the specifics of a situation while using a common hashtag (esp. on Twitter and Instagram - i.e. #breonnataylor #justicenow #weriseunited) that will help tell the story in greater detail and allow people to dig deeper into content that may expand their knowledge of the matter.



REMEMBER CARE FOR THE COMMUNITY:

We recognize that each person is a "beloved child of God – a recipient of love unearned, unlimited, and underserved – just like ourselves." We will commit to speak civilly, even with those who do not live up to the values we support. Pray for all, affirm that God's grace is available to all, and remind all persons that racism is a sin.



As we seek to be advocates, commit to learning the terminology of the movement, the hopes of those who care for its mission, and what it aims to achieve. Choose not to dismiss it as derogatory, divisive, or against our Christian witness. When we say "Black Lives Matter," we reestablish that they matter in God's eyes and, therefore, must matter to others, so we affirm equal value for all in all places, at all times, and by all people.

God created us all and we are all sacred, worthy, and equal. We call for #justicenow, #blacklivesmatter, and for an end to racism so all will be free.

TAKE RESPONSIBILITY FOR WHAT YOU SAY AND FEEL WITHOUT BLAMING OTHERS

USE EMPATHETIC LISTENING

BE SENSITIVE TO DIFFERENCES IN COMMUNICATION/CULTURAL STYLES

PONDER WHAT YOU HEAR AND FEEL BEFORE YOU SPEAK

EXAMINE YOUR OWN ASSUMPTIONS AND PERCEPTIONS

KEEP CONFIDENTIALITY

TOLERATE AMBIGUITY BECAUSE WE ARE NOT HERE TO DEBATE. THERE ARE NO "WINNERS" OR "LOSERS."





DO GOOD



LOOK + LISTEN + RESEARCH:

Commit to being a life-long learner. Learn more about the impacts of racism, trauma-informed care, white privilege, implicit bias, unconscious biases, and race. Examine and challenge your assumptions, and think about your ethnic heritage and how you feel about generalizations and stereotypes. Start by reviewing the resources at bwcumc.org/justicenow and other trusted sources.



LIKE + FOLLOW + RETWEET + ENCOURAGE OTHERS TO DO THE SAME:

There are well-researched, anti-racist, and faithful voices speaking out on systemic racism. Research those who challenge you to be more just, equitable, and faithful in your call. Be an advocate and expand their reach by offering likes, comments, following, retweets/shares, and encouraging others to do the same.



DONATE. IF AND WHEN YOU CAN:

The mission to end racism is critical, and many groups will need continued financial support to carry on the work required to make change a reality. Consider donating regularly to one organization or semi-regularly to a few that align with our values, social principles, and denominational commitment to end racism. You can also encourage or challenge others to give with you, or engage your faith community in activities to raise funds and look for opportunities where "matching" donations are available.



ENGAGE IN HEALTHY CONVERSATIONS:

Social media is a great avenue to make connections, have fun, share stories, find resources, and raise awareness. However, social media can open users to challenging conversations. Make sure you find ways to not only care for the mission, but to care for yourself and those with whom you engage in conversation with. Here are some practical ways vou can "take care":

- Be mindful of your tone; resisting combativeness is
- When a conversation has moved beyond healthy dialogue, invite individuals to chat more privately via direct message if you are comfortable. Consider asking someone you have a personal relationship with to talk more via phone or in person if you feel it will be beneficial to hear or see each other. Provide the opportunity to cool down and recompose yourself when necessary.
- When the conversation is no longer productive, disengage and consider ways to respectfully end it.
- Engage with values: The goal of conversation should be to help understand where your values align. Note that endless arguing will get you nowhere, and only continue to deepen the divide.
- Speak out against harmful, hateful rhetoric and misinformation. Please do this respectfully and with love. Be factual and exact.

*Eric Law also outlines seven principles for respectful, inclusive, and productive conversations which align with creating open dialogues that move us forward.





STAY IN LOVE WITH GOD



LOOK + LISTEN + RESEARCH:

As you become a collaborator through your digital witness to end racism, take care of yourself. You will become more aware of the violence and injustices experienced by Black and Brown people, and you may discover challenges in continuing some relationships with friends, colleagues, church members, and potentially even family. Explore ways to support those struggling with the need to distance themselves from those relationships, as it can be scary and isolating. Also, remember to pace yourself and tend to your spirit through this work. The mission to end racism is critical, and may require frequent sabbatical moments to maintain your energy. Care for yourself throughout this journey by taking breaks from social media to help you gain balance and renewal. When you feel overwhelmed, seek meaningful ways to retreat through prayer, worship, and staying in love with God.

TAKE CARE OF EACH OTHER:

We each will find moments when it may seem as though the weight of systemic racism is too heavy for us to handle, or that it is impossible to move. Again, this is not the work of one; the mental, physical, and spiritual toll can be high. This is the work of a beloved community. So, please check in with your friends, make sure they are doing okay, and take care of yourself. Be a prayer partner, a shoulder to lean on, and an ear to listen as you are able.



BE AN ADVOCATE & REMEMBER WHAT THIS IS ALL ABOUT:

It is important not to deny or minimize the experiences of others. Empathize and keep the experience of others central to the conversation. Be respectfully engaged in the conversation (see Eric Law's Guidelines for Respectful Communication on pg. 3). Resist the urge to talk about your experiences unless asked. Be kind to others and remember to do no harm.



STOP SUPPORTING HATE:

When you notice organizations that have positions, controversial statements, or actions against any minority group, address them and decide if it is ethical to support them. We each must stay in love with God and each other, and hate is a threat to that love. Resist violence of all forms, including violent speech, racism, hate, and bigotry.



WALK TOGETHER:

Impacted by the stories of Ahmaud Arbery, George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and others lost in 2020, many of us have joined in peaceful protest. These are non-violent opportunities to align our speech with our actions. Now, We Rise United as people of faith to stand against racism so that all may be free. However, it should not take another act of hate or brutality for people of faith to continue to show support and love for our neighbors. Keep supporting organizations that celebrate differences, equality, and justice. Support media, initiatives, charitable organizations, and businesses continuing the work after the attention has quelled. Most importantly, support each other in working for change and healing from the harm and division that racism causes in our society. We cannot make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world if we are unwilling to be transformed. We must be faithful in our witness and collaborative in our efforts. Love God, love your neighbor, and love yourself.
