A year ago, at our Conference UMW February meeting, we were introduced to Janice Liggins, creator of "The Clarion Call." This organization has trained Learning Coaches in its "Read to Lead" program for the express purpose of disrupting the school-to-prison pipeline (one of our UMW initiatives). I will

Learning Coaches use specific training software that enhances reading skills, and which is extremely comprehensive at the Kindergarten through High School grade levels. United Methodist Women is trusted with pledges and donations from individual members as well as mission partners and anonymous donors who have a heart for mission. The national office is committed to good stewardship of our members' generous support.



The Five Channels of Giving (*pictured to the left*) show the various ways that our members give undesignated funds to our organization. When a local UMW gives, a portion of the Pledge to Mission is kept by their respective conference for its own district and conference administrative and membership development (A&MD) expenses. The remainder of the Pledge and the other channels of Mission Giving are forwarded to the national office. The elected Board of Directors vote on the budget each year.

"INACTIVE UNITS"

United Methodist Women allows units to transition to inactive status. The process is described below. United Methodist Women cannot endorse disbanding units as the establishment of units in every UMC church is mandated by the *Book* of Discipline, ¶ 1901.

Local Presidents will need to ensure that the following steps are performed for a unit to officially go inactive:

1. Notify Leadership

- Unit president is to contact the district president and membership nurture outreach coordinator (or the conference membership nurture outreach coordinator, if needed) to report the decision and request assistance. Depending on the reason(s), the district or conference officers/coordinators may suggest a specific course of action, for example:
 - Utilize the Census Analysis 2019 to determine where active units may be within the district for members of the unit wishing to remain active with United Methodist Women.
 - Refer to the local bylaws, Article 1 Section 4b., which identifies other types of units, including how to form a cluster or charge unit. <u>https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/members-</u> <u>leaders/2021-2024-handbook/constitution-and-bylaws</u>
 - Offer "challenges & solutions" scenarios from Leadership Development Days and develop a solution for this unit.
 - Schedule a conversation with the district membership nurture outreach coordinator

2. myUMW

Prior to going inactive, the unit president will offer each individual unit member an opportunity to remain a member through joining a district or online unit or the newly formed cohort through the National Membership option. Have them enter their information into the myUMW database at www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/myUMW





Unit president shall send the name of the unit and all unit members to the district membership nurture outreach coordinator and to the National Office indicating who will remain a member of United Methodist Women and who no longer is interested in membership. The National Office email is membership@unitedmethodistwomen.org.

3. Funds

- It is required that the local treasurer will notify both the district and conference treasurers of the discontinuation and maintain communication with them throughout the process.
- The local treasurer must send the district and conference treasurers a report of the unit's giving for the past 4 years, which they will forward to the national treasurer.
- Any remaining unit funds must be sent to the district treasurer. If there are designated or restricted funds, they should be sent to the national treasurer along with the original documentation describing how the funds are to be used. The district treasurer will also require copies of the final audit/review financial report.

4. Evaluate & Report




UNITED METHODIST WOMEN 2021 READING PROGRAM

EDUCATION & INTERPRETATION

FAITH * HOPE * LOVE IN ACTION

Hello District Education and Interpretation Coordinators,

I pray that this correspondence finds you safe and well. In commemoration of Black History Month and Women's History Month, we remember Dr. Dorothy Irene Height who was born on March 24, 1912 and passed away on April 20, 2010. Dorothy Height was an African American woman who achieved notable fame in the area of Education, Social Work, Activism, Journalism, Voting Rights, Civil Rights, Women's Rights and employment opportunities. She was frequently characterized as the "Godmother of the Civil Rights Movement." Dorothy Heights was an active member of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

Dorothy Height founded the Annual Black Family Reunion Celebration on the National Mall. She was President of the National Council of Negro Women for more than 40 years and spent 33 years serving on the National Board of the YWCA. Dorothy Height spearheaded the creation of the National Commission for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biomedical and Behavioral Research in response to the Tuskegee Syphilis Study. For 10 years, she hosted a National Ecumenical Prayer Breakfast. Among her numerous accomplishments, she acquired 36 honorary Doctorates and countless awards, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

While attending college, Dorothy Height became a member of Saint Marks Methodist Church, in New York. In 2005, Dorothy Height stated in an interview with United Methodist Communications, "I find through-medication meditation and prayer that there are very few things that I do not find some way to deal with." Dorothy Height was also a member of the Women's Division, United Methodist Board of Global Ministries, and predecessor of United Methodist Women. Dorothy Height was known to carry members of the Women's Division, United Methodist Board of Global Ministries Nominating Committee, to meetings of the National Council of Negro Women, so it would be known, where their money was going. In terms of mission giving, in 2002 at Dorothy Height's 90th Birthday Celebration Event, she raised 5 million dollars to fund the mortgage at the Washington, DC National Council for Negro Women.

In addition, Dorothy Height helped organize the Women's Caucus in the National Council of Churches. Her zeal for activism, mission and mission giving was shaped by her Christian faith and calling. Following her example, we move forward with Faith * Hope * Love * in Action, in relation to our commitment to Mission and Mission giving.

The Office of Membership Development is introducing a new project to organize for growth and membership flexibility. In a statement from Ebony Diaz, Membership Development, "United Methodist Women is committed to finding new ways to invite and involve women in our 150-year-old organization with over 800,000 members. At all levels of the organization." We are living in times of change, organizationally, the United Methodist Women need to expand and explore and exponentially find creative ways to, not only support current membership, but to recruit and cultivate new members.

Focus area: **Recruitment-Building Awareness Retention-Nurture and Relationship Building Renewal-Refresh and Reset**

The following is a brief excerpt of the planned initiative; "After extensive organizational and external research, United Methodist Women (UMW) will be focused on sustaining our current membership, while simultaneously attracting more women who are 60+ within The United Methodist Church (UMC), but who do not currently identify as UMW. We also want to focus on attracting newer women who classify as spiritual, 35-59, in and out of the United Methodist Church. As an organization we are invested in helping our members reach, attract and engage new women who will aid in our mission of providing quality services, transformational education and advocacy on behalf of the needs of women, children and youth around the world."

COMMITTEE ON CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE (CFRJ)

Committee on Charter for Racial Justice (CFRJ) Members 2021

In light of all the racism concerns happening around the country, we feel it is necessary to reconstitute this committee.

The Committee on the Charter for Racial Justice Policies is a committee that has a membership of seven members, one-third of whom shall be of color if possible.

The seven members shall include the President of the Conference UMW Mission Leadership Team, who will serve as the Chairperson, the mission Conference UMW Social Action Coordinator, and the Conference UMW Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations.

Four additional members shall be nominated by the Committee on Nominations. They shall be one district president, one member of the Executive Committee and two members selected to ensure inclusiveness and/or special expertise in the skills necessary to accomplish the task.

The committee shall:

1) develop and recommend to the Executive Committee plans for the implementation of the Charter

2) monitor conference-approved action plans to implement the Charter 3) regularly evaluate progress made on conference, district and local implementation plans.


