

To all local treasurers, as we approach the end of the calendar year, remember the policy for "Emptying the Treasury" at the End of the Year. The monies given for United Methodist Women are given for mission. However, a local group may discover, toward the end of a given year, that it has more money than it needs to carry it into the first few months of the new-year. This may have happened because:

- The budgeted amount for the Pledge to Mission was too low.
- Sources of income were underestimated.
- Income from a fundraising event may not have been budgeted

A local group should keep in its treasury only the minimum amount necessary to carry it into the first few months of the next year, until members' Mission Giving pledges and gifts begin coming in. The Committee on Finance recommends how to use these extra funds. The Committee could choose one of the following options:

- 1. Send the extra funds as additional mission funds (added to your Pledge to Mission).
- 2. Present one or more Special Mission Recognitions or Gifts to Mission to members or friends of the unit.
- 3. Make a supplementary gift to "A Brighter Future for Children and Youth," a mission program that receives United Methodist Women National Office funding.

Funds given in these ways to "empty the treasury" should be sent to the district treasurer. The act of emptying the treasury is important because the funds were given to be used for mission, not to build up a bank account for the unit. Saving for a rainy day is not good stewardship since today is a rainy day for thousands of women, children and youth for whom our mission money offers hope.

Thank you for all that you do to further the mission of the United Methodist Women. May the Lord bless and protect our families, friends, and world this holiday season.



However, the usual exchange of buying and selling stocks met with unexpected concerns. The Board was mainly concerned about the uncertainty of the political and financial climates. Due to these uncertainties, the Board decided to postpone the decision to perform its usual functions at this meeting. The Board agreed to study the market, and the financial climate for a few more weeks. After this additional study, a continuation meeting of the Board of Trustees was called to order on, October 20, 2020, via Zoom. The Shattered Glass Ceiling

The 2020 election was a watershed year for women. So far, women candidates have acquired 134 congressional seats including 102 Democrats and 32 Republicans, which is a record.

The number of women in Congress has steadily climbed since 1981 when just 17 women served in both the House and Senate. In the 2018 midterms, an impressive 127 women were elected.

On January 20, 2021, Sen. Kamala Harris will raise her right hand and take the Vice-Presidential Oath of Office, shattering yet another glass ceiling in America by becoming the first Black and South Asian female to assume the office of Vice President of the United States of America.

The election of Joe Biden and Kamala Harris to the Presidency and Vice Presidency is yet another reminder of what is feasible in The United States of America. Notwithstanding your political ideology, it is undeniable that Vice President-elect Kamala Harris's election is a victory for ALL women, especially young women of color who finally see themselves represented in the upper echelons of the Federal government.

The United Methodist Women also had a role to play in contributing to this wondrous election. UMW women phone banked, organized, held Zoom meetings on the importance of voting, became poll workers, and most important --- you voted!

Now, as we begin the difficult task of **uniting our country**, we must stay engaged in the issues that affect our neighborhoods and communities. We must continue to call out injustice in whatever form it manifests itself. We must continue to hold our elected leaders accountable while in office. We must continue to listen and work with younger women for they are the **NOW** and **FUTURE** of the UMW, and provide mentoring, leadership, and advocacy opportunities, thereby offering them a space to put **faith**, **love**, and action to work.

And finally, we must continue to call on Jesus, **PRAY** without ceasing and serve those that are living on the margins.

LEGACY OF SERVICE

In 2005 when Hurricane Katrina's devastation affected Christians across the continent, Bunker Hill UMC's (Bunker Hill, WV) parishioners in the Frederick District sought ways to be of assistance. A group at Bunker Hill reached out to a UM Church in Baton Rouge, LA that had opened its doors to out-of-town emergency workers for lodging and food. One expression of congregational concern occurred when Bunker Hill shipped a quantity of West Virginia apples to the area.

From that church-wide movement of compassion, a seed of individual zeal took root in the heart of Norma Coe, a local seamstress. She determined to reach out to victims of misfortune with her sewing talents; specifically, she decided to fashion book bags for school kits. She used the UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) directions for her creations. By 2006 the first shipment of 28 school kits had left Bunker Hill.

In the years since Norma took up her personal school kit challenge, we have witnessed church friends <u>and</u> strangers jump on the bandwagon with gifts of fabric. One year, BHUMW mounted a button campaign to strengthen the dwindling supply of these notions. Early on, the Bunker Hill unit of UMW had agreed to promote this project annually with Norma leading the effort from her sewing machine.

It didn't take long for the UM Women to discover Mission Central in Mechanicsburg, PA and their willingness to partner with local churches to distribute items such as school kits anywhere in the world they were needed. Norma and many souls from Bunker Hill have been able to travel to Mission Central headquarters for tours of the facility. The spirit of giving was renewed each time a carload of Bunker Hill folks went to Mechanicsburg.


Sometime in the last ten years or so, Norma announced that she had a personal goal to stitch 1,000 cloth bags for the school kit program. Praise GOD! Norma met her goal in 2020. Bunker Hill UM Women's records show that Norma's dream has already seen 810 of her masterpieces leave West Virginia for Pennsylvania to places unknown. The dream will continue as the UMW will urge members to capitalize on back-to-school sales to fill Norma's stash of remaining totes.

In an interview recently with Norma Coe we learned about her philosophy of giving. She believes that talents, like sewing skills, are gifts given to individuals at the time of creation. Moreover, she emphasizes that these gifts are for sharing, never hiding them under a bushel.

Furthermore, she points out "that every culture has its voice," its musical preferences, food likes, tastes in color and pattern choices. Therefore, she maintains that there are no 'ugly' fabrics in the homemade book bags; someone, she says, will love a handmade bag for some reason we may not understand.

Norma is pleased that her initiative has brought her into contact with quilters from out-of-state who have wanted to donate cloth to be a part of the endeavor. Who could have suspected that a disaster like Katrina (2005) could herald such a joyous reaction that will be thriving well into the 2020's? Norma is a "difference making woman." Thank GOD Bunker Hill's UM "difference making" Women have been aligned with her.

BWC-UMW Epworth House Mission Project Committee Annual Meeting - November 10, 2020



The theme for this year's Annual Meeting was **United Methodist Women Celebrating Children and Youth**. President Gertrude White welcomed everyone and introduced Rev. Dr. David McCallister-Wilson, President of Wesley Theological Seminary, who gave the invocation, thanked the committee for their ministry, and told us that "we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses." He told the group the Seminary is now maintaining community for seven international students from Africa and China. He encouraged the group to keep up the good work.

Vice President Lynn Davenport introduced Wesley student Nadia Fitzcharles, who lead the Devotions. She read Ephesians 4:15-16, and testified that while in Cairo, Egypt she met with a group of Christian women who shared their lives with her. They told how they slept on cold tile floors, ate moldy food, received threats to take their children away, and other atrocities. It was a "room of sorrow and grief," but in the midst was generosity toward her and a deep abiding love of God.

Guest Charlene A. White sang "Jesus, You're the Center of My Joy," followed by the introduction of the Wesley Missioner-in-Residence (MIR) by Rev. Brian K. McCollum, Vice President of Development at the Seminary. Melinda Paczari-Pongor (MIR) brought greetings from the Seminary and read scripture from Psalms. She emphasized that in all of her decisions she seeks God's guidance, and she offered a prayer that acknowledged "God is the most perfect light" of the world.

Treasurer Jeanette Tolbert-Campbell reported that in May we awarded a scholarship of \$2,000 to the outgoing MIR Esther Inuwa. Donations from the BWC and Epworth House Honor/Remembrance donors totaled \$2,160 for 2020. Thank you one and all!

Nominations Chair Ellen Davis presented the proposed slate of officers for 2021 and it was accepted. BWC-UMW President Linda Yost performed the installation service and shared a lovely story titled "Flowers in the Garden". I have the chance to meet new people with new views on how to look at the world, but I am also able to meet those Hungarians who left their country for many reasons, but never abandoned their faith. It is a blessing for me to be a part of both of these communities.

I decided to study theology because I was interested in the Bible and in Christianity, not only because I believed in what they teach, but also because both of them are fascinating pieces of humanity and its history. I grew up in a non-Christian family, but I got in contact with the church in my early teenager years. I immediately felt attached to the way the people interacted with each other. I started to attend the events there because of the congregants, and slowly, even without realizing when and how, I became a believer. Ever since those months, I wanted to serve the Lord through serving my fellow humans.
