

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Sisters in Christ,

Let us give thanks for this day that the Lord has made! We are awestruck by the beauty of this world in which we live, even during this time of winter rest and renewal. May it always be so.

I greet you as your new Conference President and am excited about the future we will have together. We began our first year at our Conference

United Methodist Women's Planning Retreat on January 5, 2019, by exploring Economic Inequality, briefly defined as the unequal distribution of income and opportunity between different groups in society. We examined how this United Methodist Women's initiative could be directly related to our other four: Climate Justice; Health and Maternal Health; Racial Justice; and Mass Incarceration, School-to-Prison Pipeline. We had small group time followed by sharing of our thoughts as to how we could convey this relationship to our local units during the coming year. We watched a short video by Alex Cequea, "Economic Inequality Is a Problem We Can Solve" and which can be downloaded at the following YouTube website:

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iVX_NjKmlcg. We asked the question of ourselves, "What do United Methodist Women do well?" and came up with a list of 10 bulleted points. We then asked "What do we need to do better?" and 17 bulleted points were raised, with the top two concerns being "Better communication throughout our entire organization" and "More involvement with our Local UMW units." If we can focus first on these, we will indeed be promoting our Purpose throughout the Conference. For more details, please refer to the minutes you received from our Conference Secretary, Sherie Koob.

I recently spent a weekend in Tempe, AZ for leadership training and received extremely useful information and guidance to assist me in carrying out my duties as your President. Unfortunately, due to financial issues, this will likely be the last offsite training held in this manner. Next year National is planning training webinars, etc. to be transmitted around the country to our new officers.

A number of our United Methodist Women, including your President, attended "Rock" in Ocean City, MD, during February, and offered our services as security officers, salespersons, and spiritual guides for the youth and chaperones who attended. 5000 youth are a lot of kids! It was a new experience for me and one I will remember well.

As we look forward to spring, our 150th Anniversary Legacy Day of Giving will be celebrated on Sunday, March 24, 2019, from 3 p.m.-5 p.m. at the Conference Center in

Fulton, MD. Light refreshments and entertainment will be provided for a nominal contribution of \$18.69. Please see the colorful flyer contained within this issue of the Flame. Hoping you will plan to attend and bring a friend or two to celebrate our Legacy, both past and future!

At our BWC UMC Annual Conference in Baltimore May 29 – June 1, the Conference United Methodist Women will again collaborate with the Conference United Methodist Men at a special luncheon held on Thursday, May 30^{th.} If you are attending Annual Conference as a Lay Member or Clergy, you may reserve your ticket for this Luncheon online. If you would just like to attend the Luncheon, I have a limited number of extra tickets to sell at a cost of \$31.00 each. Kindly let me know if you would like one.

My hope is to attend as many of your District events as possible. VICE PRESIDENT

My Sisters in Christ, I greet you with the joy of the Lord. It is my pleasure to greet you as your Vice President of the Baltimore Washington Conference United Methodist Women. I am excited, honored, and count it a privilege to be a part of this wonderful group of United Methodist Women.

We United Methodist Women have historical roots. From the humble beginnings of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society first organized in Boston in response to a lack of women's health in India in 1869 to today in 2019, the work of ministry through missions continues. The approaches we use to continue these efforts are two-fold. Our first approach is following the advice and wisdom of John Wesley to "Do all the good you can. By all the means you can. In all the ways you can. In all the places you can. At all the times you can. To all the people you can. As long as ever you can". Our second approach is to follow effort the model left for us by Jesus. Located in the Gospel of Matthew 25:35-40, (one of my favorite scriptures), is a description of what we are to do for our fellow man. Matthew 25: 35 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, 36 I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' 37 "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38 When did we see you a stranger and invite you in or needing clothes and clothe you? 39 When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? 40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

This scripture describes the work of United Methodist Women and explains why we are laser focused on helping others. This was his not only his parting sermon of caution, but also a sermon of preparation for Christ's second coming. The hope is that we may then be ready to receive from him our final sentence and give an account for our lives. This scripture gives us hope that in doing well to care for others we, in extension, care for him. The rationale is clear, if we expect to be judged by Christ. The measure by which he will judge us will be based on the works we have done.

So how can we as United Methodist Women live out this scripture in our lives today? By concentrating on our initiates and by getting back to basics.

We get back to basics by living out our purpose as United Methodist Women. Are we supportive of fellow United Methodist Women, their programs, and their missions? Do we attend spiritual retreats hosted by our local unit, districts and conferences?

Are we a community of women? Do we lead, inspire and mentor other women? Do we recruit, educate and support the next generation of United Methodist Women?

Do we know God? Are we faithfully studying the word of God? Are we not only attending bible studies, but also leading bible studies? Are we using our prayer calendar, the Response magazine, or reading books from our reading program? Are we using the United Methodist Women Program Book? Are we doing everything we can to follow the word of God?

Do we experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ? Are we advocates for women's rights locally and internationally inside and outside of the church?

Do we develop creative and supportive community? Are we supportive of social action functions locally and state wide?

Do we expand concepts of mission? Do we participate in Mission u, Leadership Days, and the United Methodist Seminar Program? Are we personally participating in missions in our communities? Are we supporting work that improves the plight of women, children and youth?

Do we participate in global ministries? Are we ignoring policies and practices that support domestic violence or child abuse? Are we culturally competent to help solve immigration and refugee problems?

I ask that you look into your heart and focus your attention on the initiatives of the United Methodist Women- Climate Justice, Maternal and Child Health, Criminalization of Communities of Color and Economic Inequality.

The dilemma families are facing due to Economic Inequality are particularly troubling. Income and wealth inequality in the United States impact women and communities of color, which, in turn, further marginalizes those who may already be vulnerable. Decades of poor policy choices got us to this point. Fair and just policy changes now could reverse the income and wealth gap. United Methodist Women are called to act locally and in national efforts to begin to bridge the inequality gap.

In closing I ask that you ponder over Acts 20:35, "I have showed you all things, how that so laboring you ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive."

I pray that the work we do will speak for us.

CENSUS 2018 IS OPEN

United Methodist Women Census 2018 database for collecting United Methodist Women membership information is open. Census or membership count is conducted annually. The census is the gathering of important information to the life of the organization. Each unit is asked to submit its membership information using the Online Census 2018 Database. Each Local Unit President or designated officer is asked to complete the form for the 2018 United Methodist Women census by going to www.unitedmethodistwomen.org and click on the Census 2018 link and follow the instructions. The Baltimore Washington Conference United Methodist Women goal for 2018 Census Data Collection is to increase local unit reporting by 20%.

This year the National United Methodist Women focus will be to gather information that will inform the National office, Conference and District leadership on local efforts in order to plan for growth, outreach and impact. <u>Census Submission Deadline: Saturday March 30, 2019.</u>

At the completion of the member survey, the member will receive her printable personalized membership card. There is no deadline for filling out the <u>myUMW</u> membership log.

COMMUNICATIONS

To My Sisters in Christ:

I am excited and humbled to be a part of this awesome ministry team. I look forward to serving the team and all of the UMW of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

I give God all glory for this opportunity and I am filled with anticipation for what God is going to do with us and through us.

This is my first article as Communications Coordinator for the BWC United Methodist Women's Leadership Team.

As Communications Coordinator for the BWC-UMW Leadership Team, my responsibility is to improve communications between the Conference Leadership Team and Districts by preparing and disseminating the Conference Flame Newsletter (four times a year), the Conference Telephone Directory and prepare the Annual Meeting Celebration Program Booklet.

In fulfilling these duties, I need everyone to remember the **newswriting basics**:

1. Use the "inverted pyramid" pattern for your article. In the inverted pyramid, information is stacked in a news story so that the most important details (from your readers' point of view) are at the top of the article, the least important at the bottom, and the other material in between. When a story is too long, the bottom paragraph can be lopped off.

The inverted pyramid also works well because busy readers can grasp the information they need to know from the top of the article; those with more time can read the entire story.

- 2. Include the answers to the questions who what, when, where, why and how (or as many as possible) in the first paragraph of any news story.
- 3. Try to average no more than 20 words per sentence. Vary sentence lengths to give your writing rhythm, which makes your articles more interesting.
- 4. Keep paragraphs brief. Only rarely should a newsletter paragraph be more than three or four sentences.
- 5. Most articles should be no more than three or four paragraphs. Keep total length to no more than 200 words. One hundred to 150 is even better.
- 6. Write the way you talk. Use simple words and conversational language. Always be clear and concise.

- 7. The secret to good writing is re-writing. If you have time lay your first draft of an article aside for a day, then revise it.
- 8. Don't make your newsletter only an announcement sheet. Include mix of news about recent happenings as well as announcements about upcoming events.
- 9. Avoid phrases like A good time was had by all; friends invited, members expected; or Everyone is invited.
- 10. Do not use the newsletter to scold, chastise, humiliate, or embarrass your readers. Fill it with good news, not bad news.
- 11. Never include full minutes of meetings or detailed financial statements in your newsletter. Most people will not read these. Instead, include financial summaries and meeting highlights.

Treasurers Keeping the Channels Straight

Speaking to United Methodist Women "God is calling us. God speaks first. And together we say: Yes. God is calling us for this time. Every time has had its challenges, but it's a great time to be called to work for and with women, children and youth in our neighborhood, in our state, in our country and around the world," said Harriett Jane Olson, CEO of United Methodist Women National Office. "It's time to grow our faith together, to live our faith, and to turn faith, hope and love into action. In response to God's call—together, we say yes!"

As United Methodist Women we give over and beyond our local church tithes and offerings to **Pledge to Mission and other Mission Giving funds that are part of the five channels of giving,** which are used for mission with a focus on women, children and youth through national office, except for administration and membership development funds kept at the district and conference levels. Through our generosity United Methodist Women members help empower and improve the lives of women, youth and children in the United States and around the world.

About 70 percent of Mission Giving funds from members go to programs and projects supporting women, children and youth. Around 20-30 percent stays with the local, district, and conference organizations of United Methodist Women for local mission. Only 9 percent covers administrative costs.

Just a reminder United Methodist Women funds should not be given to the local church to help with apportionment for World Service Funds or facility and equipment needs in the local church. United Methodist Women members in the local church have already contributed to these needs through their tithes and offerings.

United Methodist Women members have long been proud to support the specific ministries with women, children and youth that are funded only through their giving to United Methodist Women's five channels of giving.

World Thank Offering

Spontaneous additional gifts can be given out of gratitude for God's abundance and in celebration of the joys of life.

The World Thank Offering is an opportunity for individuals to respond to God's abundance and grace with spontaneous gifts of gratitude. The funds collected are used in the total program of mission carried on through United Methodist Women's national office in the United States and around the world.

Special Mission Recognition Pins and Certificates

These pins offer a meaningful way to honor members who have dedicated so much time and effort to service. Gift amounts range from \$40 to \$2,000. Pins are purchased through a treasurer.

Gift to Mission

Make a gift in honor of someone and send a card to the honoree. The following cards are available: Congratulations, Thank You, A Baby, In the Service of Christ, A Special Day, Thinking of You, Happy Birthday and assorted Christmas cards.

Gift in Memory

Give a gift in memory of a member, a friend or anyone, in any amount of \$5 or more. Gift in Memory cards, available free, may be sent to the family of the deceased.

During this time of year (late winter and early spring) please check with your local units. Confirm with the local units there are no issues with the United Methodist Women Giving. Remember we are on a calendar year January –December but if the unit wants to be recognized during the District and Conference Fall Annual Celebrations they should turn their Pledges in to the District Treasurer in September. However we do expect each unit to empty their treasury per the handbook page 84 "Emptying the Treasury" at the End of the Year.

The United Methodist Women Board President Shannon Priddy said. "We are advocates for women, youth and children around the world, bringing it back to our conferences, districts, and local organizations. We are also advocates for the work we do. It is our responsibility to let others know what United Methodist Women does.Remember, we are doing God's work for women, youth and children around the world."

UMW BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

Board of Trustees Report February 6, 2019

The Board of Trustees of the United Methodist Women of the Baltimore Washington Conference is beginning its 2019 financial activities. The first meeting of this fiscal year is April 9, 2019. At this meeting the Board will review the financial reports received since the last meeting in September 2019. The Board will assess the revenue generated, and determine the disbursements requested from the qualified recipients. The voting will take place to release the monies requested. This process includes viewing the financial statement of the securities in the family of financial products in the portfolio. It also includes coordinating the treasury's report with our Security Advisor from the Lombard Securities, Inc. This step goes on even when the Baltimore-Washington Conference United Methodist Women Board of Trustees is not holding its scheduled meetings.

These responsibilities and obligations make it necessary to respond to requests for financial assistance of the designated committees of the United Methodist Women Organization. Therefore, it is necessary to follow the success or lack of success of the securities in the portfolios. In light of the stock market performance much scrutiny is paid to the Baltimore Washington Conference United Methodist Women family of investment products, especially those investments that are directly influenced by the stock market. Prayer is always in order when anticipating a healthy return from these investments. The Board of Trustees is optimistic that the constant viewing of these securities will enable the Board of Trustees to successfully manage the securities portfolio.

The specific amounts generated from these funds is reported at the April and September Board meetings. In fact, at these meetings the Board determines whether to maintain, sell or buy new securities. The decision is always based on the performance or reputation of individual funds. To accomplish the Board's financial objective, the Board manages investment funds and distributes income generated from the interest of these investments for mission projects of the United Methodist Women of the Baltimore-Washington Conference on behalf of women, children and youth.

The Board of Trustees meets on the second Tuesday of April and the second Tuesday in September each year. Quarterly, income from the Deaconess Home Fund is distributed to the Baltimore Parish Work for allocation and distribution to various activities and projects of the United Methodist Church in the Baltimore City area. Income from the Baltimore-Washington Conference United Methodist Women, Inc., fund is distributed through scholarships and projects across the Conference on behalf of women, children and youth. All disbursements are based on income generated from the

principle for the account (no monies can be, or will be, authorized that exceed the legal interest from these invested funds.) Funds that have been requested for a specific outreach project and not used for that particular project should be returned to the Board of Trustees Treasurer. We are praying for a successful financial year.

In addition to Baltimore Parish Work (Randallstown, MD), the Conference projects for UMW are: Epworth House Mission Project (Wesley Seminary, Washington, D.C.); Family Crisis Resource Center, Inc. (Cumberland); Scholarship Fund, Baltimore-Washington Conference (provides financial assistance for undergraduate students who are members of churches within the Baltimore-Washington Conference); Shenandoah Women's Center, Inc., Eastern Panhandle, WV (provides counseling and shelter for sexually assaulted and abused women and children in the Tri-Country West Virginia area); Shepherd's Staff, Westminster, MD (provides emergency services to children, adults, families, seniors and homeless in a spirit of compassion and respect); Susanna Wesley House, Baltimore, MD (provides group living in a home-life setting to nine women with modest income and their children. The women are provided schooling, job training and counseling); and YWCA Domestic Violence Counseling, Anne Arundel County (provides individual and family counseling, computer training, parenting education, mentoring after school programs for at-risk children and emergency shelter for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.)
