

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings to my United Methodist Women sisters!

May our Lord Jesus be blessing you this day!

How often have you heard a sermon in church that you really felt applied to you? Today was one of those times for me. As we listened to testimony from some of our recentlyreturned adult mission trip attendees, it became clear that God had been speaking to their hearts, calling to them to give up their selfish control, stop being a "Martha" and let God be their producer, director, sustainer and guide. Oh, how I love to be like Martha, prepared to "give it my all", making sure everyone has what they need! Unfortunately, this also includes some worrying. I forget that my job is to open my heart to what God is saying and let God work out the details. "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4:6-7

As your President, I am concerned that our two western-most districts, Frederick and Cumberland-Hagerstown, are without organized, District-level leadership. Were you blessed by Mission u this summer? About 141 adults experienced some wonderful, informative classroom instruction and grew spiritually within the Plenary time together. Our first "UMW 101" provided attendees with a detailed description of United Methodist Women structure and procedures. Our Youth School attendance doubled this year with 44 youth participating! How awesome was that? Saturday night's "Open Mic" event gave many of our young people and some adults the chance to showcase their talents. Stay tuned for information on next year's Mission u.

Looking forward, our Conference UMW Annual Celebration will be hosted by the Greater Washington District and held at Good Hope Union United Methodist Church, 14680 Good Hope Rd, Silver Spring, MD 20905 on Saturday, October 26, 2019, beginning with registration and a continental breakfast at 9:00 a.m., and program from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon. We will enjoy lunch following the program. The cost will be \$15.00 per person. Your Unit May be a Mission Today Unit! How many checks can you make?

1. *We met our Unit's Pledge / Sent our Unit's Pledged amount to the District Treasurer.

Requirements for Bronze, Silver, and Gold Certification!

- 2. *We used the Prayer Calendar at each of the general meetings.
- 3. *We have at least 2 members who subscribe to Response magazine.
- 4. *We are a Five Star Unit, contributing to all five channels of Mission Giving.
 - 5. *We used the Program Book at least twice during the year.
- 6. *We conducted at least one Mission Study per year.
- *We had at least two members attend the Mission u school.
- 8. We had at least two members (other than district or conference officers) attend each of the district or conference sponsored events.
- 9. We wrote to / e-mailed five (5) persons in the Prayer Calendar at least twice a year.
- 10. We added at least two members to our membership roster.
 - 11. We implemented the Charter for Racial Justice in at least one suggested way.
 - 12. We implemented at least one initiative using resources from National Office
- United Methodist Women's Website: www.unitedmethodistwomen.org.
- 13. We have a Response moment at each meeting as a way to tell the mission story.

14. We have at least two people from the unit, circle, or subgroup who

Completed one of The Reading Program Plans and reported on one of the books read.

BE COUNTED! CENSUS 2019 COMING IN OCTOBER!

The 2019 Census will begin in October, date to be announced. Each and every district and local unit and member is very important, we represent love, hope and faith in action by carrying out our mission and Jesus Christ mandate to make disciples. We are also advocates for women, children and youth of this world. Be counted; make sure your local unit is represented in the membership count. It only takes five minutes to complete the CENSUS SURVEY. Let's be united in our efforts to collect the count so that we continue to build a strong United Methodist Women organization for another 150 years.

Let's pull together and find creative ways to have 100% reporting in the Baltimore Washington Conference. The 2019 Census Portal will open in October for district and local units to enter their membership count. The Census Portal may be found on the United Methodist Women website, www.unitedmethodistwomen.org.

I encourage each District President and Membership Nurture Outreach Coordinator to work with their Local Units to collect the Membership Count from their units for the 2019 CENSUS.

"United Methodist Women 101" Questions and Answers

At Mission u there was a question on how often do you complete the myUMW and the **CENSUS Database**; below is the answer from National United Methodist Women:

This is a **short explanation for myUMW/Membership Log** for individual member of the United Methodist Church: COMPLETE ONCE

The "myUMW" page is an online form designed for individual members to enter their personal contact information as well as email, age range, social media presence and mission interests.. The information will assist in the creation of an individual profile for each member. This information will help us build an online membership database which will allow us to engage members around interests and for events like Assembly, Leadership Development Days, Mission u and the Seminar Program. We are excited about the prospect of mobilizing members for action around our social justice issues along with contacting our members with new and exciting events. This will allow the national office to customize each member experience and will advance how we are reaching out to members. Once an individual has completed the member registration form (log), the member will be able to print out a personalized membership card. The census and myUMW sites are both secured sites with an SSL certificate. myUMW Link: www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/myUMW

CENSUS 2019 (Local Unit Membership Count)

Census Explanation: COMPLETE EVERY YEAR

The census is released every October to Conference leadership for distribution to the district and local leadership. The census is designed to gather information at the local level in the areas of membership, programmatic and social justice focus. The information collected is used to inform National, Conference and District leadership in planning. The census and myUMW sites are both secured sites with an SSL certificate.

Greetings United Methodist Women Treasurers

Just a reminder:

"Emptying the Treasury" at the End of the Year

The monies given for United Methodist Women are given for mission. However, a local group may discover, toward the end of a given year, that it has more money than it needs to carry it into the first few months of the New Year.

This may have happened because:

- The budgeted amount for the Pledge to Mission was too low.
- Sources of income were underestimated.
- Income from a fundraising event may not have been budgeted.

A local group should keep in its treasury only the minimum amount necessary to carry it into the first few months of the next year, until members' Mission Giving pledges and gifts begin coming in.

The committee on finance recommends how to use these extra funds. The committee could choose one of the following options:

1. Send the extra funds as additional mission funds (added to your Pledge to Mission).

2. Present one or more Special Mission Recognitions or Gifts to Mission to members or friends of the unit.

3. Make a supplementary gift to "A Brighter Future for Children and Youth," a mission program that receives United Methodist Women National Office funding.

Funds given in these ways to "empty the treasury" should be sent to the district treasurer. The act of emptying the treasury is important because the funds were given to be used for mission, not to build up a bank account for the unit. Saving for a rainy day is not good stewardship since today is a rainy day for thousands of women, children and youth for whom our mission money offers hope.

NEJUMW Quadrennial Meeting: Remember to register for the Northeast Jurisdiction (NEJ) Quadrennial Meeting, held in Baltimore, April 24-26, 2020, Marriott Waterfront Hotel. The main purpose of that meeting is the election of the NEJ Board of Directors. The registration website (nejumw.org) is ready for everyone, register early for the early bird discount.

Legacy Fund Endowment Campaign: I will be attending the Fall Steering Team Meeting Oct 3, 2019, in Madison, NJ. Thanks to the Baltimore Washington Conference for supporting this campaign since its inception 2014. As of June 2019, BWC has donated \$7,554 during 2019; the total since 2014 is \$43,873. The conference goal is \$50,000. The campaign is continuing.

2020 Reading Program List: At the spring Board meeting, the Reading Program listing was approved. The 2020 Reading Program catalogue will be posted on the United Methodist Women website and available for distribution in September.

Board Responsibilities: Esther Barkat and I have been busy over the summer with conference calls and making key decisions for the future of United Methodist Women (including grant decisions). We will be attending the Fall Directors meeting, Oct 4-6, 2019, in Madison, NJ.

General Conference Delegates: Continue to pray for the clergy and laity elected during Annual Conference. Not only pray, but stay in contact with them as they will be making decisions for the whole church for the next quadrennial; especially decisions affecting women, children and youth. The national office staff is putting together a list of General Conference delegates and helping new delegates find mentors/supporters as they prepare for General Conference 2020.

We were encouraged to be open to new ways, to engage in transformative education, which is the key to our mission witness, as we explored learning together. We were challenged to put our faith, hope and love into action on behalf of women, children and youth in service and advocacy.

We were blessed to have an amazing number of participants—141 adults and 44 youth --the total included 30 first timers. God calls and invites all of us to mission studying and fellowship together, where we learned about ourselves and each other. The study leaders for the classes in: What about our Money? Women United for Change, Mark and Radical Discipleship, and seeing Mark through the Eyes of Youth, were outstanding and thought-provoking.

Feedback from participants revealed:

- 1. Fellowship and sisterhood were very important to deepening spiritual growth
- 2. Networking and gaining new ideas for mission education and outreach.
- 3. Diversity among study leaders enriched class learnings
- 4. Mission u was very organized.

The information gained will be shared with local United Methodist Women units to aid in their planning for Mini Mission u in the church community.

In areas of improvement it was noted that:

- 1. The schedule needs to be tweaked.
- 2. Allow for more breaks.
- 3. Some sessions were too long while others too short.
- 4. The cost of the school is too expensive.
- 5. Not enough time to enjoy the Transformative Learning Center activities.

6. Need more diversity among Mission u population for adult and youth participants.

Congratulations, to the Mission u Leadership team, study leaders, supporters and participants for your efforts in making Mission u a great experience. May God of all love, peace, joy and hope continue to bless you and keep you in His hands.
