Greetings to my Sisters in Christ,

One of our studies this year at the Cooperative School of Christian Mission (CSOCM) was called, "Joy to the World: Mission in the Age of Global Christianity." Jesus is our Joy! Jesus is our Hope! Jesus is our Savior! Having faith in Jesus gives us the strength and peace within to share his love with our neighbors in our communities and in our world.

Two women met together in Boston, Massachusetts, and shared their concerns for the unjust treatment of other women who lived in the far off land of India. From their compassion and love of neighbor, sharing their concerns with a group of four other women, began in 1869 what we now call The United Methodist Women. This seed of faith of 2 has grown into an 800,000-member organization of Christian women, united, with the purpose to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative and supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

You see, God is reconciling the world through his Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus has given us the great commission of spreading the Word to others. Jesus is the Word, the Gospel of John tells us, and the Bible is filled with words about the Word. It is all about Jesus and God's love for us. I encourage you to share with others your personal experiences, your stories of how you have seen God's love in your lives. (Ref: Rev. Ross, CSOCM.)

I was overwhelmed with your generous gifts of 85 prayer shawls to the BWC Annual Conference that were given to the delegates for the 2012 Jurisdictional and General Conference, the persons who were ordained, Zimbabwe guests, Bishop Schol and his wife, and the Ronald McDonald House; with your 15, 30-gal bags, of "flip flops for Haiti"; for your CSOCM offering for missions and for your on-going contributions to the "Coins for Haiti" project for the UMCOR Relief for the Prevention of Cholera. Vice Presidents



PROCESS FOR SECURING MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF UNITED METHODIST WOMEN, 2012-2016

The proposal to create a Board of Directors and Program Advisory Group for United Methodist Women has been receiving strong support. This attachment will be your guidance about how the transitional process will work.

The conference organizations of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN have a vital part in the process of securing voting members of the national organization of United Methodist Women for the 2012-2016 quadrennium. To complete this process the following is required:

CONFERENCE

A. Nominees for the Board of Directors of United Methodist Women shall be elected at the 2011 Annual Meeting of each conference organization. Each conference shall elect at least two (2) but no more than three (3) nominees from a slate named by the Conference Committee on Nominations. Additional names may be nominated from the floor of the Annual Meeting with the consent of the nominee(s).

The names are to be submitted to the Jurisdiction Leadership Team Secretary and the Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations.

Note that during this transitional time all nominations submitted by the conferences will be used to consider the selection of the conference representative for the Program Advisory Group if necessary.

- B. At the annual meeting of the conference organization prior to the quadrennial meeting of the jurisdiction organization, six (6) delegates shall be elected by the conference organization, all of whom shall be conference officers (Book of Discipline 2008, ¶647.6c, ¶534.3), for membership in the jurisdiction organization. Nominating procedures shall be established by conference standing rule.
- C. There is no automatic renomination for any person now serving as a member of the Board of Directors of the Women's Division. The Book of Discipline (¶710.4) outlines tenure limitations including the statement: "A voting member of a general agency shall be eligible for membership on that agency for no more than two (2) consecutive four (4) year terms." It further states: "A person who has been a voting member of a general agency for four consecutive quadrennia shall be ineligible for election to a general agency in the succeeding quadrennium."

JURISDICTION LEADERSHP TEAM

- A. Each Jurisdiction organization at the 2012 Quadrennial Meeting elects a designated number of women from a ballot composed of nominees from the conferences in that jurisdiction for the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Women.
 - North Central shall elect (4) Members
 - Northeast shall elect (4) members
 - South Central shall elect (4) Members
 - Southeast shall elect (6) Members
 - Western shall elect (2) Members

- B. Elections at the Jurisdiction Quadrennial Meeting will make use of the multiple ballot method of elections. The elected member(s) are those receiving the highest number of preferences and a majority (50% + 1) of the votes cast.
- C. The elections at each jurisdiction will be conducted by a member of the Board of Directors of the Women's Division who is not eligible for reelection and is not from the given jurisdiction. Training for these five (5) Directors, the chairs of the Jurisdiction Committee on Nominations, the Jurisdiction Presidents and the staff liaison will be provided in 2012.

As you work through this process, the following actions must be carried out:

- It is imperative that the United Methodist Women Board membership reflect the diversity of women throughout the church. Elements of diversity are race, marital status, ethnic and cultural background, employment and non-employment, age and physical ability. In order to achieve this inclusive membership, conferences are urged to follow these elements of diversity in nominating women for membership on the Board of Directors of United Methodist Women.
- 2. Immediately following the Quadrennial Meeting, the outgoing and incoming Jurisdiction Leadership Team shall meet or have a conference call for the purpose of selecting one (1) name to be submitted for possible membership on the Special Committee on Nominations of the United Methodist Women. The Special Committee will nominate the remaining five women for the election to the Board, ensuring diversity.

The newly elected presidents of the Jurisdiction organizations of UNITED METHODIST WOMEN become members of the Program Advisory Group by virtue of office at the organizational meeting. The twenty (20) described in the basic steps, and the five (5) women who are nominees for election to the Board of United Methodist Women, constitute the elected representatives of United Methodist Women. When the latter group of five (5) are elected, twenty-five (25) women will be the membership of the Board of Directors of United Methodist Women for 2012-2016.

The names of women nominated by conferences, but not elected, should be forwarded to the Committee on Nominations of the United Methodist Women. During this transitional time, the Committee on Nominations will select the conference representative for the Program Advisory Group from these remaining nominees.





Social Action Update

"Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute.

Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy." Proverbs 31: 8-9.

Many resources are available within our denomination to support our roles in the social justice arena. In addition to the Bible, one such resource is the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church (UMC). They are generated in tandem with other United Methodist documents, two of which are the Book of Resolutions and the Book of Discipline. Adopted officially by the 1972 General Conference, they express the Church's position on a wide range of social issues. The General Conference updates the Social Principles every four years, thus they represent the most recent position of the Church on key issues that impact humanity here and around the world.

The Social Principles serve as an informed guide which we can use to help reflect our Christianity in the Wesleyan tradition. They are divided into six separate sections: Natural World and Nurturing, Social, Economic, Political and World Communities. Some topics under these headings are immigrants, sexual abuse, energy resources utilization, family, marriage, divorce, rights of racial and ethnic persons, religious minorities, women, children, young people, and genetic technology. A few other topics are HIV/AIDs, poverty, migrant workers, corporate responsibility, education, church and state relations, the death penalty, criminal and restorative justice, and war and peace. As might be anticipated, Social Community comprises the largest section of the Social Principles. A Social Principles training resource and bulletin inserts are available at www.umc-gbcs.org.

Other resources readily available to us are the *New World Outlook*, *Response*, Action Alerts, UMW mission giving programs, conference projects, and UMW on-line communities. Use of these and other valuable resources within UMC and UMW communities also undergirds our efforts to execute the main mission of the UMC, which is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.


