

Why the name change?

1. Schools of Mission are historic to United Methodist Women and predecessor organizations. While this identity remains important, the term "school" can be a deterrent to participation, particularly to those of younger generations or those new to the organization.

2. The name "Mission u" keeps the identity with mission and reflects the personal learning experience (u as in university and u as the text and Web language for you).

3. The suggested tag line reflects the community aspect of learning and the mission goal of transformation.

4. Mission u offers a short and succinct appeal with many possibilities for promotion and publicity.

5. The name change is keeping with the vision and outcomes of the strategic plan for the organization.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING



The Lord came and stood there, calling as at the other times, "Samuel! Samuel!" Then Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." And the Lord said to Samuel: "See I am about to do something in Israel that will make the ears of everyone who hears about it tingle.

1 Samuel 3:10-11

As Christians, we are charged with listening and obediently responding to God's Holy Word. One Sunday morning, a member of Asbury United Methodist Church extended an invitation to attend the Baltimore Washington UN Seminar, which the United Methodist Women held November 19-20, 2012. The seminar's title is "Human Trafficking: Global Challenges for Today's World."

The United Nation's Office on Drug and Crime indicates "Human trafficking is the second largest global organized crime today, generating approximately 31.6 billion USD each year. Specifically, trafficking for sexual exploitation generates 27.8 billion USD per year." It involves the buying, selling and smuggling of men, women and children by forcing them into what amounts to modern-day slavery. These victims are often beaten, starved and forced to work as prostitutes and/or domestics.

When reflecting on the seminar's events, I feel blessed to have experienced opportunities which encouraged:

Sharing through the inspirational opening and closing worship services;

Broadening awareness and knowledge of human trafficking through well-prepared presentations; Openly exchanging ideas with other believers;

Translating and displaying meaningful graphic art ideas;

Contacting the President of the US of America and legislators via letters and electronic media; Fellowshipping with United Methodist Women in the Baltimore Washington Conference; and Continued bonding with others to minimize human trafficking and exploitation.

Dear Ones,

The United Methodist Women continue to turn *faith*, *hope*, *and love into action for women*, *children*, *and youth around the world*. I thank you for your perseverance, dedication, and service to others, especially those on the margins of life. We have had a very active and fruitful year. Remember that all that we do is for God's glory. In the Book of James, Chapter 2:17, it states, "...faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." I can sense the Holy Spirit moving among us as we step out in faith to make a difference and to change the world.

Our Bishop Marcus Matthews and his lovely wife Barbara attended our BWC UMW Annual Celebration held at Hereford UMC and he officiated over the Sacrament of Communion with our Baltimore-Suburban District Superintendent Karin Walker. I thank you for your attendance and for your donations of health kits for Haiti and canned goods that will help to nourish local families. Canned goods were also collected at many of our Annual District Meetings and donated to the MD Food Bank, as part of the BWC Change the World Program.

I have been asked by a member of our Conference Justice and Mercy Committee, Rev. Sonia King, to obtain the names of the churches now involved in a prison ministry. If you do have one, please let your District Social Action Coordinator or District President have the name and a POC from your church or UMW. I attended training in November called Baltimore Healing Communities Training where I learned more about how our congregations are affected by the criminal justice systems, including defendants, prisoners, victims of crimes, or people coming home from prison (returning citizens), and their family members. If any of you would like to take this six-hour training, to see how your church could be "doers of the faith" in this mission area, which costs \$25 each, please contact Rev. King at 410-255-4602. (Reference: UM Connection, October 10, 2012, page 7.) Another prison mission opportunity is called KAIROS where volunteers are trained and go into MCI-W in Jessup Women's Prison for a three-day retreat to share God's love and witness the transformation! If interested, you may obtain an application on line by going to KAIROS in Maryland.

Recently a telephone conference was held to discuss a future inter-generational event and to find ways to encourage younger women's participation in our UMW. Your local units (groups) will be receiving a questionnaire to assist us in this endeavor. Also in November, we had our first face-to-face meeting to join with the United Methodist Men in confronting the social issue of Stopping Domestic Violence, after our ribboncutting ceremony this year at the 2012 Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference. We are planning to take some actions in the near future to help to stop the cycle of violence, passed on from one generation to another.

We have been blessed by Bishop Matthews with an office space in the Conference Mission Center. When you see him next be sure to thank him for his support and generosity.

I have given you a taste of what our UMW Conference is planning for the future. As you read the other articles in The Flame, you will be amazed at all of the activity. We indeed are "doers" of the faith. Our next Conference Mission Team Retreat is January 5th, 9-4:30 PM, at the Conference Mission Center. Thank you once more for all your support.

We are a body of women whose purpose is to know God and to serve Him through providing services to women, children and youth around the World. Thank you for your support and participation in the success for the Annual Celebration on October 27, 2012, at Hereford United Methodist Church, Monkton, Maryland. The comments from the evaluations gave high praises to the question, What did you like most? Members reported the following: Mission Storytelling from the various districts and units were excellence; The spirit of worship service was wonderful; Everything was well planned; Food was awesome; Loved sharing; Meeting the Bishop and his wife; Reports from districts were informative as Mission in Action; Storytelling is s great way to learn what other districts and churches are doing to fulfill their Mission; Location , atmosphere and the program setup good; and the program was planned very well planned.

As a follow-up from leadership training with Vice Presidents' at the Annual Celebration a spiritual retreat will be planned for a date to be announced in March 2013.

One main goal for the BWC UMW Mission Team is to develop and encourage Intergenerational relationships in the work for mission between young and mature women (Inspired Young Women to Serve). As a first step an invitation was sent to each district president for circulation among their membership. And the second step a face-to-face meeting and conference call held on November 9, 2012 at the Baltimore Conference Center. The participants discussed how to reach young women and get them involved in mission services to families, youth and children. The committee agreed to draft a survey to gather feedback from women about their interest in United Methodist Women. The collected data will be used to motivate participation based up on their passion to serve. The final survey will be presented at the planning working retreat on January 5, 2013.

The UMW/UMM have actively engaged in the discussions about Domestic Violence and Abuse as a problem which affect all families, through conference calls and a face-to- face conversations held on November 11, 2012. The meetings are held at the Baltimore Washington Conference Center and future meetings are planned. Sumayya Coleman, is facilitating the process and engaging the team in developing strategies for education awareness and prevention. The presidents and vice presidents from the districts are invited to participate in this effort. We need support and participation from each district to make positive changes in the fight against Domestic Violence and Abuse.

The **planning Working Retreat** scheduled for January 5, 2013 is a good opportunity for the Mission Team to reflect, plan, discuss and dream about the work to be done on behalf of families, youth and children for the next two years. I encourage you to evaluate the scope of your of mission responsibilities and identify what improvements need to be enhanced to support the purposes for UMM. A challenge for you is to mentor a young woman and invite her be a part of the growth for UMW over the next year.

Dear sisters:

I greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. At the 2012 General Conference, United Methodist Women was allowed to separate from the General Board of Global Ministries to become an official independent organization within the United Methodist Church. Some of you have been inquiring about how this historic action will impact local units of United Methodist Women.

While the 2012 General Conference adopted changes related to the structure of United Methodist Women on the district, conference and national levels, it **did not** approve any changes to local units of United Methodist Women. Local units will be continue to abide by *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 2008* and the United Methodist Women handbook.

The 2013-2016 United Methodist Women Handbook, which will soon be off press, contains the following language to guide local United Methodist Women organizations.

Local United Methodist Women Organization

United Methodist Women are organized according to the group's need and size. Most United Methodist Women groups relate to a local church. Each local organization of United Methodist Women should have a Leadership Team, which **at minimum** consists of a **president**, **vice-president**, **treasurer**, **secretary and chair**, **committee on nominations**. (*The Book of Discipline*, 2008, paragraph 256.5) Additional leaders are chosen and committees or task groups are formed as needed.

Organizational Options and Opportunities Subgroups/Circles

Forming subgroups or circles allows members an opportunity to focus on special mission interests in smaller groups. They provide greater flexibility and freedom for participation, nurture and leadership development. Some women find that their circle is their primary connection for prayer, study and spiritual growth.

Subgroups and circles may relate to the local organization by selecting representatives to be members or connect with the Leadership Team and/or other committees, as appropriate.

Cluster or charge groups

Smaller groups in a local church may be strengthened by joining with United Methodist Women members in other churches to form a charge, cluster or other regional group.

Online Connections

Social networking through UMWOnline.net provides yet another way to organize and connect with others with a passion for mission. The primary purpose of the Online Community is to enhance the ways in which we connect and communicate with one another.

Leadership

Accepting a leadership role requires a commitment of time, energy and effort. But in return, you develop a deeper understanding of mission, grow spiritually and are sustained by the knowledge that you are making a difference in the lives of women, children and youth and unjust systems.

Leadership Team

The local organization should be structured so that the work of administration, finance, program planning, planning for mission, record keeping and nominations can be carried out. A member must be named president, and she or someone named by the team must serve as the contact person for the district organization and serve on the local church council.

The Leadership Team assigns responsibilities for all basic functions. It includes the following persons:

- President
- Vice-President
- Treasurer
- Secretary
- Chair, Committee on Nominations
- Member(s) at large, as needed
- Pastor (ex-officio, Discipline, para 256.5, Article 4)

Other persons may also be recruited to plan programs of spiritual growth, mission education and advocacy work according to the needs of your group and community. Others might organize programs for individual study and hands-on mission. Each organization should recruit leaders needed to make sure that opportunities for spiritual growth, mission education, leadership development, service and advocacy are available to members throughout the year.

Elected Leadership Responsibilities and Duties

The president, treasurer, chair of the Committee on Nominations, and secretary of the local organization each have a counterpart in the district and conference organizations of United Methodist Women. Your district counterpart will be available to give you practical advice

about how to carry out your duties and will be a source of support as you learn more about being a leader of United Methodist Women. They will provide training and give advice.

Term and Tenure of Elected Leaders

Leaders are elected for terms that are determined by their local or district unit. Tenure, or the maximum amount of time a woman may serve is described in the bylaws of United Methodist Women.

Tasks of Mission

Mission is and has been at the heart of the organization for over 140 years. Our mission tasks grow out of the Vision and Outcomes as described in Living the Vision for 2010-2020, and offer a way for United Methodist Women groups to organize themselves.

I hope this is helpful.

Our research has shown that there is a better way to equip women for mission, and the mission resource center is moving and expanding to meet your needs.


We are pleased to introduce a new and improved resource center: United Methodist Women Mission Resources!

- The mission, spiritual growth and geographical studies help give fresh perspectives and deepen our understanding of the world around us.




- The Program Book helps guide groups through a spiritual understanding of current issues and lifts up the work that your mission dollar makes possible.

Racial Justice in 2012

Racial justice should be of concern to everyone. We are all aware of the historical prevalence of racism in our country. Many thought race relations would improve with the election of Barack Obama as the US President in 2008. Unfortunately, much remains to be done in this arena. And, in this era of globalization, we find that racism is more visible, and its existence is in evidence almost everywhere.

United Methodist Women has always worked to secure human rights and dignity for all people. We have a history of being at the forefront in the fight against racism and associated injustices.

Several recent actions on the part of United Methodist Women highlight the fact that we keep the Charter for Racial Justice in focus as we work to promote racial justice here and around the world. One is our recent Hershey Fair Trade signature campaign and associated meetings and events, which reflected our position against child labor within the cocoa industry, especially on cocoa farms in West Africa. In another, the United Methodist Women's National Office reacted to anti-Muslim hate speeches reflected in signage with the placing of counter signs in New York City subway stations and in Washington, DC Metro stations.

Created by United Methodist Women in 1978, the Charter for Racial Justice was subsequently adopted by the United Methodist denomination in 1980. It connects personal beliefs to actions designed to help eliminate racism and racist attitudes within the church. We are encouraged to make the Charter an integral part of our modus operandi at all levels within United Methodist Women. Let us seize this opportunity to help bring faith, hope, and love into action, as we work to implement the purpose and missions of the United Methodist Women.

History

Schools of Christian Mission began in the mid-1930s by the Woman's Home Missionary Society. Every year more than 20,000 people participate in the Schools of Christian Mission.

2012 Report - Ann Price, Coordinator for Social Action

"...to do justice, love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God..." Micah 6:8

During this, another productive year for the B-W Conference Social Action Program, we continued to support issue education and awareness activities, district and local United Methodist Women's program events, and Conference United Methodist Women's advocacy activities.

We prioritized three issues among those prioritized by the United Methodist Women's National Office for 2012: Human Trafficking, Domestic Violence and Abuse, and Immigration Reform. We engaged United Methodist Women in advocacy actions by interfacing the Conference Mission Team, district presidents, and district and local United Methodist Women's social action coordinators. My major contacts with district social action coordinators included quarterly telephone conferences, e-mail / hard copy transmissions, and leadership updates / training sessions. District and local UMW units provided programs/events on Immigration, Human Trafficking and Domestic Violence and Abuse.

One interesting 2012 advocacy action included helping to spearhead the NE Jurisdiction UMW's Hershey Fair Trade Campaign, which ended in June 2012. We designed the postcard, gathered signatures, helped plan for and attended a Hershey Company meeting and a Devotional Service recognizing the "International Day against Child Labor". Interestingly, an October 3, 2012, Hershey Company press release announced that Hershey "will ensure all of its chocolate products are certified by 2020"!

Successful 2012 activities and upcoming events include:

-- B-W Conference UN Seminar 2011, held in New York City, November 20-22, 2011 was another exciting event. Fortytwo persons participated in the Seminar: "A Domestic and Global Challenge: Violence and Abuse against Women and Children."

---Following the Seminar, we implemented a B-W Conference United Methodist Women-sponsored Prayer Vigil in concert with the Rutgers University's International 16 Days Campaign against Violence against Women and Children.

----UN Seminar 2012 is scheduled for Nov 18th -20th, in New York City. The theme for 2012 is "Human Trafficking: A Global Challenge for Today's World".

-- MD Legislative Advocacy Day 2012, Annapolis, Maryland, co-sponsored by B-W Conference United Methodist Women and Social Justice and Missions Office was attended by about 100 persons. Three issues of emphasis for the successful day included Human Trafficking, Immigration Reform, and Poverty.

---We are now planning for MD Legislative Advocacy Day 2013, which will be held on February 14th, at the Asbury UM Church, Annapolis, MD.

-- The B-W Conference United Methodist Women participated in the Women's Division's 2011 national Immigration Survey; results are posted on the United Methodist Women national office Web site.

Additional 2012 social action advocacy activities (limited):

-- Presented a briefing, "From Passion to Action", Youth Session, NE Jurisdiction UMW Meeting, Hershey, PA, June 15, 2012

-- Led Focus Group, "The Charter for Racial Justice", School of Christian Mission 2012, Bethesda, MD, August 2012 -- Participated in a Task Group, Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors (DREAM) Act and interfaced Conference United Methodist Women to garner support for the MD DREAM Act on the November 2012 Maryland General Election Ballot (<u>Note</u>: Marylanders approved the MD DREAM Act during the November national election.) -- Advocated in support of and engaged United Methodist Women to actively support voting rights leading up to the upcoming election

-- Engaged Conference United Methodist Women in support of a Women's Division education petition campaign, emphasizing less reliance on standardized testing, including a signature campaign

-- Participated in other activities / events, including North Atlantic Regional School Nominations Committee; Conference Board of Church and Society and Connectional Table; and the MD Legislative Agenda for Women; among others

Our activities in the social justice arena are based on guidance which emanates from biblical perspectives. This accommodates the guidance for the United Methodist Church included in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church, and the Books of Discipline and Resolutions of the United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Mission statement for the Board of Trustees is to manage income from invested funds for the United Methodist Women of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, Inc. It is composed of one woman from each of the eight districts. A member of the Baltimore Parish Work and the President of the Baltimore - Washington Conference are represented with no voice or vote.

The officers of the corporation consists of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. Committees consist of investment and nominations members. The meetings of the Board of Trustees are held on the second Tuesday of April and September. Investment committee meetings are held separately approximately within two weeks after each regular meting.

The responsibilities of the investment committee is to review, evaluate, and approve recommendations, with advice from Mr. Douglas Potter of Lombard Securities, regarding the portfolio of investments for the Deaconess Home Fund and the United Methodist Women Fund. Interest from these funds are utilized advocating for women, children and youth through Faith, Hope and Love in action through conference projects and scholarships conference wide. This committee in return reports to the general board of the investment decisions made.

Upcoming plans are to be inclusive of the modern technologies as suggested by the United Methodist Women's National Office. We will perform a conference call in the near future.
