Greetings: Thank you for your great faith! In reference to the scripture above, with great faith the courageous Canaanite woman spoke truth to power on behalf of her sick daughter. That is our mission: to speak and stand for justice, for "... even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." (Matt 15:27) As we share the bread of life, the Gospel, and show acts of mercy and kindness to our neighbors, we are also building hospitals, shelters, schools and supplying needed resources to God's children everywhere. I urge you to continue putting your Faith, Hope, and Love into Action. #### MESSAGE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT



The Baltimore Washington Conference UMW and its local leadership teams are making it happened through, Faith, Hope and Love in action as well as Mission Outreach into the Community. As a conference we must give voice to the women, children and youth we serve and allow the Holy Spirit to guide our actions. We support the vision to serve as building blocks from the individual to connecting with our partners and one another helping to grow spiritually in God's grace. We must strive to show rational hospitality in welcoming women, children and youth from different ages, races, languages and cultures as a body of Christ whose purpose is to know God. John Wesley once said three rules were imperative to Christian Life: Do no harm, Do well and attend to the ordinances of God. In this light, our purpose is to know God and to experience freedom as whole person though Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concept of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church. We will move forward:

UMW/UMM Collaboration Luncheon on Domestic Violence and Abuse Thursday, May 30. 2014, 12:00-1:15 pm Waterfront Hotel in the Kent Room. The program will emphasize the second phase of the collaboration plan developed in 2012, which outlines difference strategies to use for fighting against this social issue. Annapolis District Leadership Team will show case their efforts in Domestic Violence and Abuse.

BWC UMW/UMM and Faith Trust (A Domestic Violence Initiative of the UMW-Office of the Child and Family Advocacy) are working together under a Pilot agreement for free training in domestic violence and abuse, under the leadership of Sumayya Coleman, Consultant. The 8 districts will be invited to select a team of 6 people to make up a district leadership team. This team shall be composed of two UMW, two UMM, two Youth age 16 plus, (high school/young adult or mature youth leader). The team must reflect diversity in makeup. A one day training event is scheduled for October 11, 2014, 9:00 am-5:00 pm, cost \$10.00, at Historic Sharp Street Memorial United Methodist Church, 1206 Etting Street.

BWC UMW Annual Celebration, Saturday. October 25, 2014, 10:00 am - 3:00 pm hosted by the Central Maryland District Leadership Team. The Baltimore Washington Conference Center will serve as the gathering place for the event Information will be sent when details are finalizes.

Grant award for \$5, 895.32 received from US Charitable Gift Trust/Tress Charity located in Florida was received on October 29, 2013, the funds are to be used to meet the needs for women, children and youth. Funds will be divided between eight of the conference projects including Susanna Wesley House.

The District Leadership Teams are encouraged to Make It Happen! - hands on ministry events in the community serving those in need. Let's prepare our members from inside out to make it happen. YES WE CAN!

#### **SOCIAL ACTION REPORT**



The most exciting new development is the planning of the Charter for Racial Justice Seminar, headed up by Sabrina White. This will include all conferences in our Jurisdiction, and be held in Blackstone, VA, at the Blackstone Conference Center on May 15 - 17, 2015. Our BWC president, Nancy Randers-Pehrson, and Education and Interpretation Coordinator, Willa Kynard, are on the planning committee, as well as Kathleen Charters, Ann Price and me, when I return from Nicaragua.

<u>Follow-up on our MD Legislative Action Day</u> -- Although the Paid Safe and Sick Leave Act did not pass this session. Melissa Broome, our speaker from Working Matters on Legislative Action Day, reports "our work has not been in vain. There is clear recognition throughout Annapolis that Maryland will pass a paid sick days standard – just not in 2014. It is only because of the overwhelming strength and perseverance of this remarkable coalition that the Earned Sick and Safe Leave Act received so much attention this year." A recent poll determined that 80% of Marylanders favor the bill.

Follow-up news on two of the immigrants who told their stories and participated in the Civil Disobedience in front of the White House in February, along with me, Harriet Olson, two other UMW New York staff and two Methodist bishops: Herminia has been reunited with her 20 year old daughter, who had been incarcerated for months in Arizona simply because of being undocumented. Pilar is still fighting for her husband, a tax-paying father of two young girls, incarcerated in Morristown, PA simply for lack of documents. We are told by the immigrant organization we worked with that our action in solidarity with them on President's Day has been helpful in influencing slight changes in these and other situations and perhaps in President Obama's thinking.

The Washington East District held a very successful program on Human Trafficking and Slavery at a luncheon on April 12, 2014 in Forestville, MD. They had several impressive speakers. Good work Nona Colbert and Michelle Dixon. This is one of our UMW focus issues for 2014.

I attended Assembly for the first time in April and found it a very powerful experience. The march for economic justice in partnership with the low-income community of West Louisville was an example of putting our faith in action. We walked and sweated and yelled together for a more just society. Another high point for me was the workshop on Faithful Living in a Climate-Challenged World, where we were joined to Bill McKibben, founder of the global climate change movement 350.org by video conference who challenged us to speak truth to power by pressing policy-makers to take urgent

action on curbing greenhouse gas emissions. When I went to the 350.org web site, I was directed to a petition that Sherie Koob's (chair of Board of Church and Society) husband Mike has initiated for our BWUMC Conference to divest of stocks of the biggest carbon producing companies. Go check it out yourself and consider signing. I did. The issue will come up for a vote at Annual Conference.

I am afraid that I will be away from you July – December, as my husband and I will be teaching in Nicaragua, at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Evangelical University, a contact made when our church, Chevy Chase UMC, went there on a Mission trip. I should have lots of stories to share with you when I get back and resume my position in January. Thanks to Ann Price and others who will be filling in for me.

#### REPORT ON APPALACHIAN MINISTRY NETWORK SPRING



"The mission of the United Methodist Appalachian Ministry Network is to partner with annual conferences, districts, local churches and general agencies to develop and support leaders within the United Methodist Church in Appalachia."

The Appalachian Ministry Network Spring Meeting was held on April 3-4, 2014 in Charleston, West Virginia at the Blessed John XXIII Pastoral Center. (The Executive Committee met on April 2.) I arrived on April 2 because the meeting started at 9 a.m. on April 3. The evening of April 2, I was invited to attend a discussion with members of the Executive Committee on several issues they were considering:

- The next AMN Assembly is 2016. There were concerns regarding probable attendance.
- Discussion on the lack of continuity because of structure and shifting membership.
   While there are 139 slots and 43 named members, only 21 were in attendance at the
   Spring meeting. (31 have been in attendance in the last quadrennium.) Note: The BWC
   UMW did not fund attendance at the fall 2013 meeting, one of two yearly meetings, the
   BWC representative was not present to continue work with the UMAMN.
- The group discussed best practices for boards including making changes to the make-up
  of the board, changing to an invited board or a designated board.
- Concerns were voiced about GBGM which gave UMAMN a grant of \$5000 two years ago. This funding may be designated for training. There is rotating representation that reports to the jurisdiction.
- What would be the impact of changes on the finance committee.

The primary tasks of the meeting were the selection and announcement of the new executive coordinator, the meetings and work of the 5 working groups, and reports from the Finance Committee, Nominations Committee and Personnel Committee. (The group with primary responsibility for the selection of the new executive coordinator.) The five working groups are Assembly (for which a new chair was selected), Advocacy (which did not have a chair), Hunger and Poverty, Resourcing/Networking, Governance.

During this meeting I chose to work with Resourcing/Networking because there was only one member, the chair present (UMW representative). I volunteered to work on an information flyer for use at upcoming annual conferences. I prepared two versions and submitted them to

the chair and the executive coordinator. I continue to work with the chair and the executive coordinator on this project and have asked that the committee be included in this project.

I served on the Hunger and Poverty Working Group in the Spring 2013, however, because they had several members in attendance and had worked together at the October 2013 Fall meeting, I decided to work with Resourcing/Networking where I thought I could make the best contribution.

I will separately email: the agenda, the announcement of the new executive coordinator, and the executive coordinator report to the UMAMN Spring meeting. The UMAMN would like us to display the final flyer at Annual Conference 2014.

The next UMAMN meeting is set for Sept. 11-12, 2014, tentatively in Knoxville, TN.

#### **EDUCATION AND INTERPRETATION COORDINATOR**



We have just returned from Assembly 2014: Make It Happen! This wonderful Assembly, held in Louisville, Kentucky at the Kentucky International Convention Center, boasted more than 7,500 persons worldwide in attendance. Included in this number were 168 persons from The Baltimore-Washington Conference, with many being first timers. We were happy to have Bishop and Mrs. Marcus Matthews and family, Bishop and Mrs. Felton May, Bishop Violet Fisher and many other Baltimore Washington Conference local pastors.

In addition, to plenary sessions, activities included a scavenger hunt; creating derby hats, intention beads, prayer cards, prayer stones, and tambourines; Open Mic Night; and Beading with Kristen Vincent, author of Beading and Prayer.

National Mission Institutions were also present: Bethlehem Centers Nashville, Community Development for All People, Crossroads Urban Center, Cunningham Children's Home, Epworth Children and Family Services, Gum Moon Women's Residence, Henderson Settlement, Houchen Community Center, Mary Elizabeth Inn, McCurdy Ministries, Open Door Community House, Red Bird Missionary Conference, Tacoms Community House, Wesley Community Center, Wesley Community Center (Ohio), Wesley House Community Center (Tennessee), and numerous exhibitors.

Various workshops included Birthing a Healthy World, Building Multicultural Congregational Partnerships – The Role of United Methodist Women; Communicating Faith in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century; Fair Trade; Ending Domestic Violence; and Creating a Healthy Environment for children and Families in your Local Church; and many more.

The daily schedule incorporated morning worship at 9:00 and evening programs at 8:00. The first night's presentation was from Rev. Bridgett Ross. Her message was phenomenal, which set our spirits on fire. We were all very proud of her – it was a great way to end the night. Thousands of United Methodist Women left our Assembly meeting in the relatively affluent East

Louisville downtown to stand with low-income neighbors on the city's west side. We marched several blocks to Baxter Square Park, near the Beecher Terrace public housing complex, carrying signs that read: "economic injustice = economic insecurity." This realty was visible to the marchers as they crossed from one neighborhood into the other, just a few blocks apart.

The United Methodist Women and the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) announced a joint initiative on maternal health during the April 25 Assembly evening plenary worship. This initiative aims to help save lives of women and their children, according to the committee. This initiative will contribute to women's health globally by raising awareness of the challenges and by strengthening maternal health programs.

Another highlight of the Assembly was that twenty-six women from 18 conferences were consecrated as United Methodist deaconesses during the closing plenary worship of the United Methodist Women's "Make It Happen!" Assembly. One of our own, Jane O. Grays, Outreach Aide, McKendree-Simms-Brookland Outreach House, and Washington, DC was consecrated. We are very proud of Jane.

Hillary Clinton encouraged us as she shared her love and gratitude to all the United Methodist women in her life and then challenged us to go out and "make it happen." At our Saturday morning worship service, she said that United Methodist women have a great tradition of rolling up their sleeves and taking the social gospel into the world. Mrs. Clinton also declined the honorarium offered by UMW and paid her own expenses. She began by telling us about the influence her United Methodist family had on her life. She urged the church to continue its social witness for the world's children and to cultivate "a new sense of caring" about its responsibilities to the larger society. "This has been a wonderful assembly," she said. "It just shows how great United Methodist Women are."

Quite a bit of information was brought back such as joyful workshops, inspiring plenaries and new friendships along with greeting the ones we knew. Our keynote speaker was former U.S. Secretary of State and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton who encouraged the UMW to "Wake Up the World."
- Improved communications between Conference, Districts, and Local Organizations We have attempted to improve communications by utilizing our newsletters and verbal statements at our Mini Mission u and Leadership Training.
- Improved awareness of the Mission Projects. We have itemized these projects in the District's newsletter and verbalized them at the Mini Mission u and Leadership Training event.
- Implement the Charter for Racial Justice. No attempt has been made for this 2014 goal yet.
- Live out our Purpose and to add one new Local Organization to each District. We have continued
  to live out our Purpose by knowing God (worshiping), developing a supportive fellowship
  (planning events) and expand concepts of mission (health kits, backpack lunches, prayer shawls,
  pillowcase dresses, prison ministry, SWH, homeless shelters, Imagine No Malaria and
  elementary schools). One new Local Organization has been added to the District.
- For the District's social concerns, our Social Action Coordinator has been in close contact with
  the Conference counterpart in dissimulating data by means of the District's newsletter. Local
  Organizations were instructed to secure information from the National website. For attempting to
  stop Domestic Violence, we have acquired resources from the local government organizations for
  church presentations. No actions have been taken in reference to Immigration Rights and
  Environmental Justice.
- The Baltimore Metropolitan district will have representation at the UMW/UMM Luncheon at the Annual Conference.

- The district is anticipating:
  - supporting another district's spring/summer events.
  - planning the fall meeting for 2014.
  - planning the Conference Fall meeting for 2015.
