

What we see emerging from the Spiritual Literacy project is simply and profoundly the hope of "a Common Tree" — something which lives and grows as a gift to the community to which it is given. By our efforts, in partnership with others and the Spirit of God, we aspire to add beauty and depth to our world, that all may be blessed.

The Need

The Landscape of our society, in spiritual terms, is little more than a valley of dry bones. We find more and more people who are looking for meaning beyond the traditional religious structures. Meanwhile, even within the church, few people even expect to experience an encounter with God.

The Goals

- Create a collaborative, interactive experience, first for clergy, then for both clergy and laity (and eventually those outside the church), where people can learn to talk about spirituality and its role in their lives.
- Create a way for people to start their spiritual journey in a multitude of ways: with service, belief, study, or community relationships.
- Help people recognize and overcome the inherent limits of language in discussing God.
- Guide our church so it can help people gain greater access to the Eternal.
