Making Disciples of Jesus Christ

Building H.O.P.E. is not only how we live out our vision and mission, but it is also how we develop and nurture disciples of Jesus Christ. Hospitality is reaching out and receiving new people by proclaiming the gospel, seeking, welcoming and gathering people, both strangers and friends, into the body of Christ as equals.

Offering Christ is offering opportunities for people to make a commitment to Christ through baptism by water and the Spirit and profession of faith, to grow in personal holiness through a relationship with Christ and others.

Purpose is preparing and equipping people for Christ's service by learning what it means to live out our beliefs through acts of piety and acts of mercy, sharing our faith and engaging in service.

Engagement is sending out grace-filled followers of Jesus Christ who put their faith into action. Through engagement we offer hospitality to the stranger, inviting him/ her into the fellowship within the body of Christ.

DISCIPLESHIP DEVELOPMENT PROCESS


As a congregation, we endeavor to provide opportunities for those seeking to encounter God's grace through worship, family or community fellowship, spiritual formation, generosity, service and personal relationships. We accomplish this through a discipleship plan that equips persons for service in God's kingdom. Our Discipleship Plan has four foundational pathways to discipleship: **Encounter, Engage, Educate and Empower.**

- **Encounter**: Provide opportunities for those seeking God to encounter God's grace through worship, community, spiritual formation, service and personal relationships.
- **Engage**: Participate in the worship experience to engage the transformative love of God by committing to Jesus Christ, regularly attending worship service, biblical studies, praying, giving, generosity and serving others.
- **Educate**: Exploring the means of grace to become more aware of the movement of God in ones' individual, congregational, community, and everyday life. As well as practicing the means of grace and exercising the gifts and disciplines of God through the ministries of the church.
- **Empower**: Practicing and living a lifestyle of daily worship that empowers others to accept Christ through an example of worship, service, tithing and discipleship.

1) SHOW UP & WARM UP

Showing up is the most important part when it comes to starting any new discipline or learning. If we are going to get in better physical shape, we get started by signing up for one class, stepping on the treadmill at home, or going for a walk. Showing up is also the most important step in developing a relationship with God and a community of faith. And if you're ready to take this step, we cannot wait to meet you and welcome you to MVP.

3) PUSH PACE

At push pace, we push ourselves to move faster and go deeper. This pace is an intentional decision to allow our lives, routines, and priorities to be disrupted as we seek to love God and neighbor with a greater intentionality. We start to see what we can do when it comes to glorifying God with our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. We begin to see a change of the heart that comes when we push ourselves beyond our comfort zone.

2) BASE PACE

In the group workout that is inspiring this journey, base pace is "a challenging but doable pace" on the treadmill. It is a pace that increases one's heart rate but still reveals how there is room for significant more growth. This pace lays the foundation for all that is to come and pushes us to grow by giving more of ourselves to the experience.

4) ALL OUT

When we go all out, we make the transition from. "I'm not so sure I can do that," to being surprised by all we can do as our hearts reveal how much they have been stretched. strengthened, and transformed. When we go all out, we no longer seek to love God and neighbor when it is convenient or when it fits into our schedule. discipleship Rather. our becomes a way of life as we seek to love God with all that we have while loving our neighbor as we love ourselves.



A recent group workout trend that focuses on strengthening the heart through science, coaching, and technology inspires our Discipleship Pathway for the Faith Fitness Journey. This boutique fitness community founded in 2010, has grown to 1500 locations the world around where individuals participate in an hourlong class that includes walking, jogging, or running on the treadmill, rowing, and strength training. Coaches push participants to embrace a variety of paces throughout the class with each pace playing an important role in one's heart health.

What if our journeys of faith were to include similar paces as we, too, seek maximum results from the inside out?

- Local licensed pastor for 7 years.
- Served two congregations:
 - o Araby UMC 6 years
 - Rural transitioning to Suburban
 - Lisbon UMC 1 year
 - Rural with new development occurring
- Introduced intentional discipleship to both congregations.
 - Araby UMC
 - Introduced in 3rd year with no engagement
 - Reintroduced in 4th year with 1 person engaged
 - 5th Year 4 people engaged and given leadership positions
 - 6th Year began discussions with other non-profits about how we could create a ministry that met a need that was not currently being met.
 - Reappointed in the middle of these discussions. One of the people engaged and in leadership appointed for the first time.
 - Lisbon UMC
 - Transition Meeting Set clear expectations
 - 1st Year Introduced Intentional Discipleship Pathway
 - Started 1st Bible Study Group called Grow Group
 - 6 people involved
 - Invited two people into one-on-one intentional discipleship
 - One is still in the process
 - 2nd Year Started 2nd Grow Group
 - 5 people involved
